## 4 KEY QUESTIONS TO IDENTIFY TURTLES

of the Bellinger and Kalang catchments

There are three freshwater turtles known from the Bellingen area. If you want to know which one you've seen, you can get a good idea by taking note of four things, none of which require you to pick the animal up.

## Where did you see it?

- How long is its neck and head?
- What colour are its eyes?
- Does it have a 'helmet' or head shield?
- It's never recommended that you capture a turtle or pick it up, especially if it looks sick, but there is one more thing on the underside of the shell that can help tell these three turtles from each other...

## Eastern Longnecked Turtle

- In the Kalang River.
- In the Bellinger River, including downstream of Lavenders Bridge at Bellingen.
- In creeks and dams
- On land, away from water, often crossing roads.



Neck is up to 60% of the length of the shell.

## Murray River Turtle

Emydura macquarii



- In the Kalang River.
- Not usually seen on land unless basking or laying eggs and even then it will remain close to the water.









Critically Endangered NSW & Commonwealth

- In the Bellinger River mostly upstream of Lavenders Bridge at Bellingen.
- Not usually seen on land unless basking or laying eggs and even then it will remain close to the water.
